## HISTORY SLEUTHING!

Did you ever wonder why, in 1804, plans were underway to start a Presbyterian Church in the Village of Galway, when the Presbyterian Church formed by the original Scotch settlers of Galway was just two miles south of the Village of Galway? Could it be that it was not originally started as a Presbyterian church? The evidence leads to it being a Congregational church. If so, how could it be a part of the Albany Synod of the Presbyterian Church? Did you know the great revival in 1820 that flooded the Galway churches (both Baptist and Presbyterian) and added to the Methodists was started in the public school

in the village among the young students? Did you know that the Methodist church came into existence through prayer meetings held in the public school in the Village of Galway? Where was that public school? Did you know that a nearby local Presbyterian church (Charlton Freehold) was started with members who came from the famous Tennent church in New Jersey? William Tennent was the well-known Presbyterian minister of the First Great Awakening, who started the Log College which became Princeton. The Charlton Freehold church's pastor, Rev. Sweetman, who was baptized by William Tennent, was present in the revival. It broke out in Charlton just before Galway and 84 members were added to the Charlton Freehold Presbyterian Church. Did you know that the Catholic church building on East Street has a window in it dedicated to a Methodist minister who was pastor there?



## 1820 REVIVAL IN GALWAY

A very special series of meetings are going to be held in the first week of March in celebration of a Saratoga County-wide revival that reached the Village of Galway in the first week of March 1820. Dr. Nott of Union College was preaching in what was to become the Presbyterian Church in the village in 1837, (the present Galway

United Methodist Church) and Rev Asahel Nettleton, a well-known Congregational revivalist came to labor in the revival. (photo: Nettleton).





Join local author and GPS member Alan Maddaus on March 5th at 7:00 at Galway Public Library as he discusses his book, *The Prestons of East Street: The Story of a 19th-Century American Family.* The seven children of Dr. and Mrs. Calvin Preston--Charles, James, William, Platt, Sophia, Maria and Calvin--were raised in rural Galway, New York, their lives to be influenced by major events of the latter part of the 19th century including Manifest Destiny, the Second Great Awakening, Gold Rushes, Civil War, the Transcontinental Railroad, Galveston Hurricane and the Second Opium War. Their intertwined stories, from the time they departed Galway for destinations far away to the passing of the last sibling were researched in detail and provide an interesting saga of that time period. *The first week in March will be a week of Galway history!*
