## n Moshervílle

Mosherville was named after the Moshers who settled there in the late 1870s. In the middle of the 1800s the Moshers built a foundry directly over a creek on the North side of rt.29. This foundry was powered by a huge19 foot high water wheel. They specialized in two types of plows, and the Mosher Plow became a trademark. It changed hands several times and finally around 1895 was sold to Frank Fonda. Because low water in summer would sometimes cause power failure, Mr. Fonda replaced the wheel with gas power. Mr. Fonda also operated a cider mill at the same site for many years. The plow industry was discontinued in the mid-1920s. Mr. Fonda also ran a grocery store and delivered groceries all around the countryside, first by horse and wagon, later by an old small truck van. Upon his death, his son, Hawley, took over the store and became widely known for the cheese in which he specialized.

The old Wright Mill was located on the south side of rt. 29 almost directly across from the old Leonard Still farm, presently owned by Bob and Jean Koslowski.\* It was powered by a large wooden water wheel set in a swiftly running stream about two hundred feet below the falls from a small pond to the west. When started it accommodated one run of stone, a turning lathe and a shingle mill. Lyman Wright ran this, but upon his death his son Charles and wife Emma took over, and during the late 1800s and early 1900s it was converted into a grist mill where they ground corn and possibly other grains. They continued to make shingles. It was probably abandoned somewhere between 1915 and 1920.

The original District 8 (Mosherville) school was located on rt. 29, halfway up the hill west of Mosherville. Arthur and Ruth Armitage now live at this site.\* A new school, used until the consolidation of schools, was built just north of Mosherville, now converted into a home by Mr. and Mrs. David Davidson.\*
