Liberty Flag Event ~ Bonnie Donnan

Schenectady County Historical Society has announced their first event in the local commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the birth of America. They have invited all to join them January 12 at noon to raise the Liberty Flag in Schenectady.

The event will assemble at the Schenectady Historical Museum, 32 Washington Avenue in Schenectady, and then walk to the corner of Church and Union Streets to relive the raising of the Liberty Flag. A flagpole will be put up, and a replica flag will be raised. A few brief remarks on the importance of liberty will be followed by a move inside the First Reformed Church for refreshments, and an invitation to sign a "liberty board" with discussions of what liberty means. Since this is a largely outdoor event in January, dress with the weather in mind.

This event marks the action of January 12th, 1774, when an angry group of about 50 people gathered in what was then the center of town to raise a square, dark blue silk flag, homemade, with the stitched-on word "LIBERTY." The local opinion of the demonstrators ranged from patriots to rioters. This early division, before the historic Revolution and the formation of or country, invites us to ponder what liberty is, and the conflict of the present day.

Schenectady County Historical Society owns the only surviving "Liberty" flag from the Revolutionary War. The flag has been proudly exhibited at the Museum of the American Revolution in Philadelphia, along with a photograph of Nicholas Veeder, sitting outside his home in Scotia. Veeder was known as the last surviving veteran of the Revolution, living until age 100 in 1862. The photo shows what looks to be the Liberty Flag behind him.

Gettysburg Flag Company has information on the origins of the Schenectady Liberty Flag, and will happily sell you a reproduction. Their information adds that a conflict in Schenectady motivating the development of the flag was the original Dutch settlers belief that the more recently arrived English did not have property rights within the area.
